Cabbage of the palm. The cabbage palm (Sabal palmetto) grows almost everywhere in the state, and the leaf-bud or "cabbage" at its top may be eaten either raw, cooked, or pickled. It has a pleasant nutty flavor and is sometimes considered a delicacy. Unfortunately, removing this bud usually kills the tree which is a serious consideration today compared to what it was in sparsely populated early Florida.

#### SCOTIA PLANTATION

Those of us who have lived in Florida for many years have been amazed or amused, or sometimes both, at the names developers confer on their subdivisions to add to their sales appeal. Sometimes, however, those names are grounded in history rather than fancy. Such is the basis for "Scotia Plantation," a large apartment complex located between South Federal Highway and the Intracoastal Waterway in Hypoluxo.

[The following is an adaptation of an account given of the history of Scotia Plantation by Margaret Garnett Harris in *Pioneer Daughter.*]

John Brown came to Hypoluxo from Dunfermline, north of Edinburgh, Scotland in the 1890s. He built a house on fertile land he purchased that was several tracts south of where the Garnetts lived on what is now U.S. Highway 1. After the house was completed, he returned to Scotland to bring to Florida his wife and four children. He sent his two daughters to St. Joseph's Academy in St. Augustine where one became ill and died. The other became a nun and devotedly continued work at the school. The older son, Gordon, moved to Australia where he remained. The younger son, James Murray Brown, married Harriet (Hattie) Wilkinson. In 1920 James and Hattie Brown began construction on a house just south of his father's place which was somewhat more pretentious than the one his father had built. The two-story house was stucco over cement block with a red tile roof. Harriet Brown supervised the extensive landscaping. They named it Scotia Plantation. After Hattie's death, James married Florence Parsons. No children came from either marriage.

The property changed hands several times after James Brown sold it. The so-called mansion surrounded by overgrown landscaping has evoked some fanciful stories of its past. At one time it served as a movie set where parts of the movie *Body Heat* were filmed.

John Brown, the father, had specialized in growing winter vegetables and was known locally as "the pepper king." His son James was known as the gentleman farmer of Hypoluxo and grew asparagus plumosus under half shade made of wooden slats just north of Hypoluxo Road where High Ridge Road is now.


