The **Boynton Beach Historical Society** presents tonight's speaker, **Dr. Cori Convertito**.



In 1961, two friends from Broadway visited the island of Key West. **Peter Pell** and **Jim Russell** fell in love with their surroundings: brightly-colored flowers, exotic fruits, and resplendent birds.

Residents urged them to open a silk-screening factory, which became **Key West Hand Print** Fabrics. The company began printing and selling textiles to visitors, and hired an artist named **Suzie Zuzek dePoo** who produced a marvelous array of tropical imagery on fabrics. One of the company's principal customers was **Lilly Pulitzer** of Palm Beach.

This presentation tells the story of how Key West Hand Print Fabrics became a backbone of industry to the island.



Dr. Cori Convertito, Ph.D. (Exeter), MA (Greenwich) is Curator and Historian for the Key West Art & Historical Society in Key West, Florida, a position she has held since 2012. The museums she oversees include the Key West Museum of Art & History, the Key West Lighthouse & Keeper's Quarters, Fort East Martello Museum, and the Tennessee Williams Museum. She has researched and installed over 45 exhibitions on both art and history topics. Additionally, she hosts a monthly talk entitled 'Happy Hour with the Historian' which looks at various aspects of Florida Keys history.

Dr Convertito holds a Ph.D. in British Naval History from the University of Exeter, UK, her thesis entitled 'The Health of British Seamen in the West Indies, 1770-1806', was awarded the Boydell & Brewer Prize for the best doctoral thesis in maritime history 2011-12.

Boynton Beach Historical Society Member Receives Emeritus Faculty Status

On February 22, 2023, **Voncile Marshall Smith**, was awarded emeritus faculty status by **Florida Atlantic University**. The honorary title is given to retired faculty in recognition of their lifelong achievements in higher education. The celebration coincided with the 50th anniversary of the founding of the Department of Communications by Dr Smith. The department is known today as the School of Communication and Multimedia Studies.

In addition to being a Lifetime Member, Dr Smith has held many positions for the Historical Society including President, 2nd Vice President/Membership Chair, Treasurer, Parliamentarian, and Editor of the Society's newsletter, *The Historian*, from 2002 to 2019. In 2015, the Historical Society presented Voncile with the Award of Excellence for her dedication to the Society and the newsletter.

Dr Smith was a vocal proponent in the long campaign to save the Boynton High School from destruction. The renovated building now serves as the Boynton Beach Arts & Cultural Center. The Society held the 2022 and 2023 Florida Highwaymen Art Shows in the former gymnasium.

Join the Boynton Beach Historical Society and friends for a guided tour of historic Ocean Avenue, Town Square, and vicinity. This will be an educational 75-minute walking tour of downtown Boynton Beach. Historian **Janet DeVries Naughton** will guide the exclusive narrated tour and share information about the history of Boynton Beach, historic buildings, and homes. Points of interest include (as time allows) the post office, churches, 1926 high school (Boynton Beach Culture and Arts Center), 1913 elementary school (Schoolhouse Children's Museum), City Hall/Library, Centennial Park, The Gables, Charlie Pierce/Barefoot Mailman, Magnuson House, Henry Flagler's East Coast Railroad, Murray House, Capt. Kenny's House, Andrews House (Boynton's oldest house), Ruth Jones Cottage, and the Oyer block (Hurricane Alley).

Note: This tour takes place outdoors and there is a significant walking requirement. Wear comfortable shoes and bring water. The group will meet at 10:00 am on the west side of the 1926 High School building (Boynton Cultural Arts & Cultural Center, 125 East Ocean Ave, Boynton Beach 33435).

Taking Care of Your Family Photographs

A frequently asked question I receive at the Local History Archives concerns how to take care of collections of family photographs. While family papers, ancestry trees, clippings, etc. are very important to any family history, it's photographs that are usually the most treasured, providing immediate connection between generations.

The first thing to undertake when starting a project of caring for your family's historical photographs is to make sure photographs have been collected and identifications are with the photograph. As a person who has been handed bags of unidentified snapshots with the admonition "Keep these, they're of cousins," I know how frustrating it is to have a photo and not know who it is. Get identifications while you can; too often the only person who knows passes away before it's written down. Many photographs allow identifications to be written on back, or better, on foil-backed labels that can then be affixed to the back (I've seen photos where penciled identifications have made dents or let ink go all the way through the photo).

The next concern is where the photo is being stored. The ideal temperature for photographs is below 70° F; humidity should be kept between 30% and 50%: so not the garage or attic! High humidity can lead to fading, discoloration, and silvering, as well as mold growth. Extremely low humidity can lead to photographs becoming brittle or the emulsion flaking off. The worst conditions for storing your photographs would be an area with wild fluctuations of temperature and humidity (think summer and winter), which can cause the paper or board that the photograph is mounted on to deteriorate and curl.

Light and handling are also enemies to photographic preservation. Ultraviolet light damage is irreversible, and oils from hands can cause chemical damage to an image. Also, being stored with sharp, decaying, or rusting items such as rubber bands, paperclips, and framed items can cause damage. There are many websites selling archival quality storage for photographs, including storage sleeves with binders or boxes, complete with labels. Universityproducts.com and Gaylord.com are two good sources. Never laminate your documents or photographs!

If you decide to donate your photo collections to an archive, please make sure that you're donating them to a reputable organization that will make them available to the public. Too often people give their photo albums to someone they trust and then later see it on eBay!

If you decide to digitize your family photographs, be sure to scan them at "high resolution," (600 dpi for an 8x10, 1200 dpi or higher for smaller images, slides, and negatives), and save as a tif, which is an "uncompressed" format. Color photocopying is NOT the same thing! Images can always be reduced in size if you want a smaller file for sending by email or posting on the web. And if you include the person's name and date (if known) in the file name, you'll be glad of it later.

I hope everyone considers starting that long procrastinated project of organizing your family photographs and remembers that the Local History Archives is always available to help.
