The **Boynton Beach Historical Society** in partnership with the **Florida Humanities Florida Talks Speaker's Program** is proud to present tonight's speaker, **Magdalena Lamarre**.

The nation's first Underground Railroad was established in Florida in the late 17th century, serving as a beacon of freedom for runaway slaves from the American south. Existing before the better-known Northern Underground Railroad, enslaved Africans gained their freedom by escaping and earning asylum in Spanish Florida. This presentation focuses on Florida's early history as a Spanish territory, the escape routes used by runaway slaves, and the black communities they established before the abolition of slavery in the United States.



Magdalena Lamarre was a Full Professor of History and Sociology at Miami Dade College until her retirement in 2016. Currently, she presents programs on topics related to Florida History, and American Popular Culture through the lens of Comic books, which address culture, diversity, and social justice. Lamarre earned a BA in History from Hunter College, an MA in History from Stony Brook University, and did post-graduate work in Sociology and Education at Florida International University and the University of Miami. At Miami Dade College, she co-produced three oral history documentaries: 'Surviving and Thriving' (2012) - Holocaust Survivors' experiences during and after the Holocaust; 'Crossing Bridges Towards Equality' (2015) - Civil Rights era integration of a high school in Alabama; and 'Forging New

Lives After Hurricane Maria: Puerto Rican Student Voices' (2019) - Documenting the experiences of students who moved to Miami and enrolled at Miami Dade College (MDC) after Hurricane Maria. In 2011 she was awarded the prestigious MDC Alumni Association Endowed Teaching Chair, and in 1994 and 2012 the NISOD (National Institute for Staff and Organizational Development) Teaching Excellence Award.

Back in the 1940s we went to town for everything. Gas, groceries, haircuts, post office, doctor. Going to town was where you saw everyone. Everything was right there on Ocean Avenue in Boynton. And everyone knew everyone else. Our two older cousins, **Elisabeth K (Liz)** and **William D Brown (Buddy)** lived in town, as did our Aunt **Mabel Rousseau Tuite**.

At the west end of the Oyer Building is a small park. A great place for kids. But back then, instead of banyan trees, we had large poinciana trees that stood like giant orange umbrellas shading the swing sets and the tables where old men played checkers.

I attended Boynton Elementary for a short while before we moved to Lake Worth. The school accommodated first through sixth grades, and two of the six teachers were my aunts—**Callie Rousseau Brown** and **Mabel Rousseau Tuite**.

I loved the barbershop in downtown Boynton. For a little kid the barbershop was a big deal. I sat up on that board placed across the arms of the chair, and had the cloth draped over me just like the men. I loved the smell of the place and the buzz of the clippers.

My other favorite place was Partin's Ice Cream parlor, located in the eastern half of today's Hurricane Alley. We sat at the marble countertop, seated on swivel stools, eating ice cream until we shivered from the cold. My sister chose vanilla and I had chocolate. **Dan Partin** was usually the one dishing out the ice cream. On the north wall of the parlor someone had painted a mural that covered the entire space, a copy of the Great Seal of the State of Florida. It fascinated me.

The grocery store was always a special place. It wasn't an A&P, but I remember it smelled of freshly ground coffee. I know it didn't happen every time we went there, but it seems some older person would always hand us a penny to spend when we got to the candy display. Remember, it wasn't like getting money from a stranger, it was someone we knew or was related to our family.

On the south side of Ocean Avenue stood a hotel. I believe it was three stories tall. Our granddad, **Abel Augustus Rousseau** (nicknamed Eb), 1878-1960, lived there for a while. I recall the wooden stairs and floors. It had no airconditioning and depended on the sea breeze for relief. There were many days when the rooms were unbearable. On those days the residents filled the park across the street. I was fascinated by the idea of living in a hotel. A couple of times I spent the night there with granddad, and loved looking out the window, watching people and cars go by below on Ocean Avenue.

In the late 1940's, my family was living southwest of Jupiter on a thousand acres that bordered the Loxahatchee Slough. Granddad would come visit us and though he was in his seventies, I was honored to saddle a couple of horses and he and I would ride for hours through the Slough. There were no fences. We would ride along, and he would tell stories of his boyhood, like the time he hired on as a cow-hunter for **Dr. Lykes**, who shipped cattle to Cuba. In 1893, he was fifteen, he said the older cow-hunters tried bullying him, so with his first wages he bought a new Smith & Wesson .38. After they discovered he would shoot to defend himself, no one bothered him again.

I heard stories about our great uncle's (**Thaddeus Rousseau**) schooner, *Red Squirrel*, and how Granddad and Uncle Thaddeus were sailing from Clearwater to Key West when they came upon a large diamond back rattlesnake swimming across their bow—headed west, the nearest landfall being Central America.

All those dozens and dozens of stories inevitably ended with my granddad's most common complaint: "You just don't understand, son. Florida today isn't at all like it was when I was a boy."



Accessions for 2022

The Local History Archives received some very interesting donations this past year. While all donations are appreciated, there were a few spectacular contributions.

- The Boynton Beach Historical Society newsletter editor's files from Dr. Voncile Smith. These included
 materials that members had sent in for inclusion in the newsletter (2022.002), including many photos from
 several families, including Betty Zobel, the Swilley and Weeks families, Grace Knuth, Anne Weems
 Michael, and Don Cherry, Jr. Many of these are now available for viewing online, and a few were included
 in earlier issues of *The Historian*, encouraging input on identifications.
- Miss Gillian Davis continued to donate, and some of her School of Dance performances are now available online.
- The Traylor family papers are rich additions to our historical collections.
- The **Bernard Thomas** Christmas cards are charming.
- The Boynton Police court docket (18 Jan 1927 to 9 Sept 1935) offers a very interesting and rare glimpse of life in Boynton. It has been digitized in its entirety and made available online.
- In response to the Historical Society being awarded the Judge James R. Knott Historical Contribution
 Award by the HSPBC for their efforts to rescue the 1913 Boynton Elementary School and 1927 Boynton
 High School, the Archives has built a collection of images of those efforts for display and archival
 documentation. There were a huge number of images in Barbara Ready's Facebook group of the 2009 and
 2015 protest rallies, and I tried to collect and get permissions from photographers as best I could.
