



The largest audience for any of our programs to date sat fascinated as enactor **Peter Wise** assumed the role of U.S. Vice President Aaron Burr, one of our most ambitious and controversial Founding Fathers. The program, "Aaron Burr, Jr., His Life and Time," carried us through Burr's early years, his professional and political successes and failures, and his ultimate duel with Alexander Hamilton which created a controversy which is still unsolved today about who fired first and resulted in Hamilton's death.





This is a small part of the story of three amazing women who lived in close proximity to each other as neighbors and friends. For more than sixty years these ladies cultivated and nourished the lives of their offspring and so many others in the 100 block of N.E. 12th Avenue. They shared their wisdom, kindness and provisions as if we were one family.

Mrs. Geneva Russell (November 24, 1916 - May 6, 2017): first on the block in 1940

Geneva Green was born November 24, 1916 in Savannah, Georgia. Her family moved to Delray Beach in 1924. The fourth of six children, she was educated at the Delray Public School headed by Professor S.D. Spady.

She was married to Milton Russell, Sr. of Abaco, Bahamas. To this union seven children were born, resulting in the births of 15 grandchildren, 20 great grandchildren and 8 great-great grandchildren.

Her hobbies included reading, completing word puzzles and watching quiz shows. She was a charter member of the Boynton Beach Church of God where she was in the Women's Ministry, Church Musician, Church Secretary, and more importantly, she assisted her husband in ministry as he pastored churches in South Bay, Labelle, Jensen Beach, Sharpes, Port Salerno and Boynton Beach. She also provided medical transportation for elderly citizens. She was the designated driver for the trio we called the "Golden Girls" for their weekly social outings. Not only was she the only one in the group that could drive, she had an excellent driving record. She made the best yeast dinner rolls in the country and always made enough to share with us all.

Recently Mother Geneva Russell was listed into the Congressional Record of the United States Congress by the Honorable Alcee Hastings, Member of Congress. This speaks volumes regarding her life and legacy.

Mrs. Queen Esther McClendon (May 4, 1916 -): moved to the block about 1944

Queen Esther Phelps was born June 4, 1916 in a small town in North Georgia. She graduated from Lamson High School where she excelled in basketball and track. She also spoke a second language: French.

She was married to Edward McClendon and they had one son who blessed them with 10 grandchildren, and as a result, she has 53 great grandchildren, 63 great-great grandchildren and 5 great-great-great grandchildren.

Queen Esther McClendon is a long-time member of St. John Missionary Baptist Church in Boynton Beach where she was a Sunday School Teacher and President of the Missionary Society. She was also a member of the Boynton Community Women's Auxiliary.

Her hobbies included cooking, playing card games and checkers and watching the Game Show Channel. The older kids in the neighborhood remember Mrs. Queen would challenge them to foot races on our unpaved roads. She would give them a head start and still win.

Mrs. Hilda Pitts (December 8, 1913 - August 20, 2016): moved to the block about 1945

Hilda Girtman was born December 8, 1913 in Boynton Beach, Florida. She was married to Solomon Pitts of Waycross, Georgia and to this union 8 children were born, resulting in the birth of 9 grandchildren, 15 great grandchildren and 5 great-great grandchildren.

Mrs. Hilda was recognized as a Gold Star Mother after her son Cleveland made the ultimate sacrifice while serving in combat in the United States Army. During the Centennial Celebration of the City of Boynton Beach, she was found to be the City's oldest living native. On November 14, 2016, through the efforts of Vice Mayor Mack McCray, she was honored posthumously with a Congressional Award from the United States House of Representatives 114th Congress by the Honorable Alcee Hastings, Member of Congress.

She was a long-time member of St. Paul African Methodist-Episcopal Church and later became a member of New Christian Life Church. She served faithfully as a Missionary and as an Intercessor. Her missions work included visiting the sick and the incarcerated with her friend Minister Viola Thompkins. They also collected, purchased and

packaged clothing and other items to ship to needy families overseas.

Her hobbies included reading her Bible daily, pencil and ink drawing, cooking, gardening and greeting customers (along with Mrs. Russell at times) at her shop, "Mrs. Hilda's Antiques," which was located in Boynton Beach on East Ocean Avenue.

As children, young adults and now senior adults, we realize that we all have been blessed to have had these matriarchs in our lives and to have grown up in the 100 block of N.E. 12th Avenue.

Addendum

In 1958 we welcomed Thomas and Bloneva Williams and their family to our little block. We were excited because her brother James (Bill) Butler was the first African American to join the Boynton Beach Police Force. Our families all became very good friends and we are still to this day. 
Ordinarily this takes no more than 15-20 minutes. The newly constituted Board of Directors are installed at the

Because of changes in building ownership and construction plans within the City, the BRHS has had to make new arrangements for locations for our meetings.

The City Library will close in a month and is scheduled to be razed. Construction will begin on a new combined Library and City Hall to be completed in 2019. The Woman's Club is now owned by the CRA and scheduling is more complicated than previously.



Message from Boca Raton Historical Society President Randall Gill THE BLESSING OF LIBRARIES AND BOOKS

It's fascinating to learn more about the library history of Palm Beach County in the new book *Overdue in Paradise*. This book was written by Janet DeVries, Graham Brunk, Ginger Pedersen, Shellie Labell and Rosa Sophia. It includes a team of other contributors that help us appreciate how libraries have changed our Florida history and culture.

The back of the book has this splendid quote by Desiderius Erasmus, "Your library is your paradise." My book shelf at home is my paradise. It includes children's books, history books, art history, novels and poetry. I have an autographed copy of Jaws signed by Peter Benchley. He even drew a picture of a shark next to his name. A treasure I found at a church sale! I also have a copy of the novel When Elves Attack by Tim Dorsey. He autographed it for me when he visited the Boynton Beach library, wearing his shorts and tropical shirt.

I have well-worn Bibles and hymn books from the 1800's. One of my favorite books is a leather bound book I bought from an elderly woman at her farm house sale in Northern New York, The Life and Times of Abraham Lincoln. It contains his speeches and proclamations and is dated 1865, the year he died. The book concludes with the following quote about Lincoln, "The heavens are his home, but the world and its records will take care of his fame." How true!

Google and the internet are fine tools for finding information, but books still have a magical quality for me, knowing that other people have touched and read their contents. I am connected to history as I look at crushed dried flowers between the pages and the splattered ink from a pioneer child learning to write.

The appeal of books is that there is no end to them. The end notes, indexes and table of contents lead me down new roads. The stacks on my night-side table never get smaller, the books rotate as one gets read and a new title takes its place. Books take me to new places and I never know when I might receive an unexpected blessing.

I am grateful for the libraries mentioned in **Overdue in Paradise** which contain collections and reference materials the are making a difference in people's lives today. They are a golden treasure for all who enter!

THE BOYNTON BEACH HISTORICAL SOCIETY MEMORIAL FUND

We have is a Memorial Fund which we maintain separate from our other accounts. Members and other friends have contributed to it to honor special events or in memory of a friend or family member.

Sometimes we receive gifts in small amounts for special recognition of a child's birthday or even a good report card. Other times circumstances such as the passing of Harvey Oyer, have lead to larger sums which cumulatively may reach several thousand dollars

Some of the money, for example in honor of Harvey, was used to have a 1976 video on the History of Boynton Beach reprocessed, printed and made available for purchase by our members and the public. A gift from the Neff family led to their request that we have the South Palm Beach (Boynton) Inlet declared an historic site with the erection of a marker so designating. Other examples of how we use memorial gifts have included having a collection of paintings by nationally acclaimed artist Bernard Thomas, which he had contributed to Forest Park School, cleaned, repaired and relocated. We have presented a number of books on Florida history to local school libraries.

We mention this fund and some ways we have used it with the hope that you will think about helping us to memorialize someon or some event in your life.



IN MEMORIAM



Freddie, as we knew him in elementary school, began first grade at the Boynton School in 1937 with classmate Gloria Partin whom we mention below and several other members of the ynton Beach Historical Society, namely your editor and Alice Nain Weems Weaver. Fred, as he was called as an adult, was born in Boynton to parents who were very active in the community, Charles Herbert Senior, Sr. and Laura Jensen Senior.
